

The Pastor's Corner

This morning, a dawn chorus of birds awakened me to the beginning of a new day. The dawn chorus begins a few hours before dawn, a bit early for me; and yet it is a tangible sound and sign of spring, the lengthening of days. On Ash Wednesday, the church began the Lenten journey, a time for soul searching, sorting our priorities, reflection, repentance, and renewal of our spirits. The word "Lent" has its origins in an old English word for "lengthen" referring to the gradual lengthening of the days as we anticipate the arrival of spring.


One of my favorite poets is the late Mary Oliver who for many years lived in Provincetown and was well known for walking the trails of Cape Cod National Seashore. She was a keen observer of nature, and her own spirituality was nourished in God's creation. In these words from her poem Sometimes, Oliver offers us these "instructions for living a life" which are fitting words for reflection during the Lenten season. She writes:

*"Instructions for Living a Life:
Pay Attention,
Be Astonished.
Tell About it."*


Message from the Director of Music

The refurbishment of the Casavant organ is almost complete! As with most large projects, it has taken longer than expected. The finish date has been moved to February 2, 2024.

When my family and I left for vacation on December 26, 2023, the great division of the organ was still mostly void of pipes. Upon our return, I peeked in the pipe chambers and was greeted with rows of shiny pipes. Seeing the windchests full of pipes filled my heart.

As I am writing this in my office, I can hear the organ as the workers from the firm of Czelusniak et Dugal painstakingly voice and tune each pipe. The organ will be in factory-new condition when they are done. I'm waiting patiently to be able to play it again and look forward to our rededication concert on Sunday May 19, 2024 at 2pm. That also happens to be Music Sunday; the day that we celebrate the Music Ministry at First Congregational Church during our Sunday morning service.

On Saturday, January 27, we welcomed pianist Olga Rogach and baritone Ron Williams for a concert of African-American spirituals and piano music by African-American women composers. Crossing Over into Campground was an afternoon of beautiful music and the stories that accompanied these melodies. African-American Spirituals often contained coded messages to help people enslaved in the south escape to the north using the underground railroad. The spiritual Wade in the Water was meant to tell people to use river crossings to throw the dogs off the scent. We also heard the stories of pioneering African-American women composers and Ron Williams' own encounter with Dr. Martin Luther King. The exquisite piano playing of Olga Rogach and the buttery smooth voice of Ron Williams made for an excellent afternoon of music.



I am friends with a man whom I have known for 45 plus years and who appears to have been unjustly convicted of a crime and sentenced to 63 years in prison with a minimum of 23 years to serve. Without going into the details, he is incarcerated in Pennsylvania. He has a doctorate in Christian Ethics, is published, and was most recently on the faculty of a major university.

I have been trying to continue to be a supportive friend and correspond with him to keep tabs on how he is doing and lift his spirits. When I asked him if there was something we could do as a church, he shared with me how desperate he is for books, as the prison library has a very limited collection. He asked me if people might send him select books, that once he reads, he would in turn donate the books to the library.

★ I ask that if anyone is interested to being part of this special mission, I will be available after worship to answer any questions and provide a book title with instructions and how to send him one of the requested books.

The books will have to be paperback and shipped directly from Amazon to a very specific mailing address required by the prison.

Churches are meant to be sanctuaries with open doors and safe spaces where people can enter and meet in peace and harmony.

Church building security is a topic that has become critical in the last ten years as problems such as intruders and property damage have been increasing. With the right protocols and systems in place, a church can better protect its community from unauthorized access, theft or violence.

First Congregational Church Shrewsbury, is home to both internal committees and community groups such as the Scouts, Twelve Step groups, preschools, and more. The presence of young children has increased the need for safety.

Our church has implemented a variety of safety measures including key cards, which allow doors to the main exterior doors to remain locked.

Unfortunately, we have noticed that there are a variety of doors and windows that have been left open and/or unlocked, creating safety hazards for all.

We would appreciate if everyone using the building could follow these simple guidelines:

1. Enter through the main entrance only, using the key card.
2. Do not prop the entrance doors open or the door by the kitchen (unless carrying items in the building for limited amounts of time while an individual remains at the door).
3. Please be attentive to all posted signs regarding building use.
4. Open only essential windows and doors while in immediate use, close and lock promptly after use.
5. Exit the building through the main door, making sure all the doors and windows are locked and all lights are turned off.
