### Request for Payment of Capital Campaign Pledges for Organ Rebuild

The following is a summary on where we stand on our financing of the organ rebuild.


Total Cost of Rebuild:	\$433,820

Since the Capital Campaign is spread out over 3 years, people who participated in the Capital Campaign have the option of paying their pledges over that period of time. However, based on the current pledge payments, we are \$154,577 short of the \$200,520 that is due between June and the end of August. Unfortunately, we will need to borrow this amount from our Antenna Fund and paying it back as the pledges are received. Based on this, we are humbly asking, if at all possible, if you could submit any outstanding amounts that you have pledged for the organ rebuild as soon as possible to minimize the cost of borrowing from our Antenna Fund. 





# CHRISTIAN EDUCATION

The Students Together Opposing Prejudice (S.T.O.P.) program is an initiative designed to foster inclusivity and combat prejudice among middle school students. Implemented over a seven-week period, this curriculum is facilitated by high school students who have undergone leadership training. The program employs an array of engaging games, activities, and peer discussions to instill in participants the ability to identify, challenge, and effectively respond to stereotypes, prejudice, and discrimination. By nurturing a well-rounded understanding of diverse perspectives, S.T.O.P. empowers young individuals to forge meaningful connections with those who differ from them. The program aims to develop participants into future leaders and model citizens. We are currently seeking enthusiastic middle school students to join our upcoming Fall 2023 cohort, as well as dedicated high school facilitators. High school students who volunteer as facilitators will accrue valuable leadership skills and earn volunteering hours, further enhancing their profiles. Middle school participants will gain interpersonal and communication skills, equipping them with the tools necessary to effectively combat prejudice in their communities. # MUSIC MINISTRY

### Message from the Director of Music



The Shrewsbury Ringers, with Jeanine Vitale, Andrew Lefferts, guest ringer Larry Piper, Karen Daukas, Shana Mitchell-Hopkins, Linda Ryan, Caroline Espe, Curtis Smith and Kathi Buzzell.

From June 23-25 the Shrewsbury Ringers attended the Area 1 Festival Conference at Worcester State University. The Festival Conference is three days of intense rehearsals and classes. Handbells are a relatively new instrument invented in England about 70 years ago. While there are selections from the classical repertoire that have been arranged for handbells, neither Mozart nor Beethoven ever got the chance to write for the instrument.

Handbells are a unique instrument. Most of the players only play two notes of the scale. Apart from an Indonesian Gamelan orchestra, I cannot think of another instrument that works in a similar way. Because of this, it is one of the

most community-based instruments. The 5 octaves of handbells that we use at FCC work best with 13 players. Playing even a 5 note melodic line usually involves at least 3 players working together. You might start the melody, but it is then handed off to your neighbor. This requires a level of listening and sensitivity that is unique to handbells. It's also an

exercise in giving up your ego. You don't get to own the music you play. When the melodic line is handed back and forth between the players, you rely on your neighbors to finish what you started and vice versa.




University. Approximately 300 ringers from all over New England and beyond rang together for the event.

When I play solo piano or organ, I get to play what I want, when I want and how I want. When I play the handbells, I need to blend with my neighbor and react to what they are doing. One of the things we work with in the Shrewsbury Ringers and Parish Pealers is sensitive playing. Feeling the clapper hit the bell and listening to your neighbor are two very important aspects of making music with handbells. These two aspects help me get into the handbell zone.

We juggle so much when making music. When brain imagery is done with musicians, fireworks show up on the fMRIs as the neurons do their work. We are juggling input from our eyes, ears, sense of touch and our motor control to make the music happen.

The highlight of the festival was when the renowned handbell composer and conductor David Harris was listening to our Coppers Festival Choir rehearsal. After the group finished, he said, "That was so amazing! You do that so well that you disappear and all that's left is the music." How did we do it? We got ourselves in the handbell zone. It is quite a paradox. One must at the same time juggle the sensory-motor and yet give up the ego and follow the conductor and blend with the group. Are you interested in giving it a try? 

For the nineteenth year the Shrewsbury Garden Club is sponsoring its annual Scarecrows on the Common Display.

Individuals, groups, businesses and clubs are encouraged to display their scarecrows for all to enjoy. There will be no judging but all registered entries will receive special recognition.

### How to enter:

- 1. Create your scarecrow(s) at home.
- 2. Bring them to the Town Common the week of September 18th
- 3. Choose a spot to display your scarecrow.
- 4. You are responsible for installation. No poles will be provided.
- 5. Name of club, group, business or individual(s) must appear on the scarecrow.
- 6. Your entry will remain outdoors for an extended period of time, no perishable goods such as pumpkins, gourds, squash, apples, tomatoes, etc. will be permitted. No electricity is provided but solar, battery or wind power is allowed.
- 7. Scarecrows MAY NOT be attached to the bandstand, memorial, newly planted trees or lamp posts.
- 8. Scarecrows MUST remain on the Common through October 20th and then REMOVED. Any scarecrows remaining after October 22nd will be discarded at owners expense.

The Shrewsbury Garden Club has the right to refuse any entry they feel unacceptable or inappropriate and are not responsible for loss or damage to scarecrows while on display.

### To all our outside groups, committees, and ministries:

Make your church the safest place in town.

Churches are meant to be sanctuaries with open doors and safe spaces where people

can enter and meet in peace and harmony.

Church building security is a topic that has become critical in the last ten years as problems such as 2. Do not prop the entrance intruders and property damage have been increasing. With the right protocols and systems in place, a church can better protect its community from unauthorized access, theft or violence.

First Congregational Church, Shrewsbury, is home to both internal committees and community groups such as the Scouts, Twelve Step groups, preschools, and more. The presence of young children has increased the need for safety.

Our church has implemented a 5. variety of safety measures including key cards, which allow doors to the main exterior doors to remain locked.

Unfortunately, we have noticed that there are a variety of doors and windows that have been left open and/or unlocked, creating safety hazards for all.

We would appreciate if everyone using the building could follow these simple guidelines:

- 1. Enter through the main entrance only, using the key card.
- doors open or the door by the kitchen (unless carrying items in the building for limited amounts of time while an individual remains at the door).
- 3. Please be attentive to all posted signs regarding building use.
- 4. Open only essential windows and doors while in immediate use, close and lock promptly after use.
- Exit the building through the main door, making sure all the doors and windows are locked and all lights are turned off.
